The Henry Institute is now accepting applications for the Paul B. Henry Semester in Washington D.C. Scholarship. Up to two scholarships of \$2,000 each may be awarded to a Calvin student who is accepted to participate in the 2019 spring Semester in Washington D.C. The scholarship will be credited to the student's financial account to defray the costs of the spring semester tuition and room/board.

**Eligibility:** to be eligible, students must be formally accepted into the spring semester program, and must participate in the Semester from January 26 through April 26, 2019.
