

**Towards a Focused, Shared, Missional Purpose:**  
Renewing Our Commitment to Christian Education at Calvin Christian School  
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I chose to look again at our mission and vision statements, and develop core values and a graduate profile.

We were able to successfully revise our mission statement. The other three objectives will be the focus of the 2018-2019 school year.

For our mission statement revision, I held separate faculty, board, student, parent and donor meetings.

For all but the student meetings, the following 5 questions were explored:

1. **What are the non-negotiables of our school's mission? What will not change next year, in twenty years, or forever?**
2. **Why are parents willing to make the financial commitment to send their kids to CCS? What do we have the potential to do better than anyone else?**
3. **What do (and should) we celebrate?**
4. **What are the most compelling messages in our story? How do we present our school to our community and the world?**
5. **How will we know we are accomplishing our mission?**

For the student meetings, the following 3 questions were explored:

1. **Why do your parents want you here?**
2. **What do your parents want you to become?**
3. **What should never change at Calvin.**

We were challenged to simplify our mission down to just 8 words (1 verb, 1 target, 1 outcome). We got close.

**Previous Mission Statement**
