"Exact Subject Search," articles on any subject may be found.



Congratulations to Dr. Raymond Mentzer of Montana State University for being awarded the National Huguenot Society's 1995 book prize for his work *Blood and Belief* (Purdue University Press, 1994). This biennial award is given to the best scholarly work published during the past two years that deals with any aspect of the Huguenot movement.

Scholars of the French Reformation might note the recent establishment of the Société Montalbanaise d'Etude et de Recherche sur le Protestantisme. Located at Montauban and dedicated to the study of the Protestant movement in France, the Society has undertaken to assemble a wide range of primary and secondary works. The collection is open for public consultation. The Society welcomes scholars, particularly those whose research interests touch upon Protestantism in the southern French context.

The Society also sponsors a variety of conferences and seminars on the Reformed tradition. For the past two years, it has been the principal support for a four-day choral workshop in mid-July. Focusing on the psalms of Clément Marot, activities have included choral singing, lectures on the Psalms in the Calvinist world, and several public concerts.



The Meeter Center is currently accepting applications for the 1996 fellowship awards. The following three fellowships are available: The Faculty Research Fellowship, the Student Research Fellowship, and the Emo F. J. Van Halsema Fellowship. Completed applications should be submitted to the Director of the Meeter Center by January 1, 1996.



Dr. Stephen Spenser of Dallas Thelogical Seminary

Recent scholars in residence have included Dallas Theological Seminary Professor Stephen Spenser and Princeton Seminary Ph.D candidate, Bonnie Pattison. Dr. Spenser did research in the area of Calvin's covenantal theology, and Ms. Pattison is working on the concept of spiritual poverty and the Genevan church.

1997 Faculty Research Fellowship Award. Starting with the 1997 Faculty Fellowship award, there will be a substantial change in this fellowship. Currently, the fellowship lasts for six weeks. The new Faculty Fellowship will be expanded to 14 weeks. The Meeter Center is adding a \$300 travel reimbursement and a \$1,700 conference grant if the fellow-in-residence presents at one of the following conferences an original paper written from research done while visiting the Meeter Center. These conferences are the Sixteenth Century Studies Conference, the Calvin Studies Society Colloquia, and the Medieval Studies Conference at Western Michigan University. Applications for the 1997 fellowship are currently available, and completed applications are due September 1, 1996.
