CURATOR'S CORNER: NUMISMATICS AND THE CENTER

The Meeter Center has a very fine collection of medals commemorating the life and work of John Calvin as well as important events in Calvinist history. As with many collections of this type, there is a story about how it came to be.

Several years ago Rev. Ray W. Teeuwissen gave his medal collection to the Meeter Center. On the day the medals were received and Teeuwissen was honored for his gift, a seminary student was part of the audience. This student was inspired to become a collector of all things related to John Calvin and some of Calvin's fellow Reformers. Twenty-five years later, the collection which grew out of that interest was presented to the Meeter Center as another gift. It is with deep gratitude to Robert (Bob) King that we thank him publicly for his generosity. An interview with Bob is available to view on the Meeter Center YouTube channel.

Bob loves all his pieces but has a few special ones, like this 1909 piece (see image on the left below) which is more of a mini-statue than a typically flat model.

Another intriguing piece is again from 1909, but is a restrike of the original 1835 bronze medal (see above image on the right). The Numismatic Cabinet of Geneva produced only 73 copies from the original dies. Proceeds went to benefit the Hospital Gourgas in Geneva.

The Meeter Center Presents THE PURITANS AND THEIR IMPACT

September 24-25, 2021 Calvin Theological Seminary

Just over four hundred years ago, in 1620, the Mayflower arrived on the shores of Cape Cod. Many of those on board had left England first for the Netherlands and then embarked on the transatlantic voyage because they felt they could not live within the theological and liturgical framework of the established Church of England. Within the next decades, these dissenters, known as the Pilgrims, were joined by other Puritans, establishing colonies along the northeastern seaboard of North America.

Many aspects of this migration have become part of the fabric of the story of the United States, yet this legacy is complex and deserving of further reflection. To shed light on the Puritans and their impact, and to foster informed discussion, the Meeter Center is organizing a two-day conference on September 24 and 25, 2021, at Calvin Theological Seminary. All are heartily welcome. In plenary lectures and panel discussions, expert presenters will focus on the theological roots of Puritanism and on the history of Puritans' actions and legacies in North America, including their relations with Native American communities.

Speakers include Margaret Bendroth (executive director (ret.) of the Congregational Library and Archives), Richard Muller (emeritus, Calvin Theological Seminary), Matthew Tuininga (Calvin Theological Seminary), Chad Van Dixhoorn (Westminster Theological Seminary Philadelphia), Abram Van Engen (Washington University in Saint Louis), and Adrian Weimer (Providence College). Conference participants will also get a special tour of the Meeter Center's Puritan exhibit, with several rare books on loan from Puritan Reformed Seminary's extensive collection. Meeter Center Visiting Scholars Summer 2021

We welcome our fellowship awardees from 2020 who were not able to come last year due to pandemic restrictions. Each of the fellowship recipients will present on their research towards the end of their stay.

Meeter Family Fellowship:

Rev. Dr. Jennifer McNutt, Franklin S. Dyrness Associate Professor of Biblical and Theological Studies at Wheaton College, will work on a theological biography of John Calvin, for Oxford University Press's Christian Theology in Context series. Fellowship awarded in 2020.

Friends of the Meeter Center Research Fellowship:

Dr. Christine Kooi, who is the Lewis, Katheryn and Benjamin Price Professor of European History in the Department of History at Louisiana State University, will begin research for a major essay on the role of women in the Netherlandish Reformation. Fellowship awarded in 2020.

Faculty Fellowships:

Dr. Henk van den Belt, Professor of Systematic Theology at the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam, will explore the doctrine of providence in the formative period of the Reformed tradition. Fellowship awarded in 2020.

Dr. Amanda Eurich, Professor of History at Western Washington University, will continue her research on the Huguenot jurist Jean de Coras, and his role in radicalizing religious identity in sixteenth-century France. Fellowship awarded in 2019 and deferred from 2020 due to pandemic restrictions.

Student Fellowships:

Preston Hill, Ph. D. student at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland, will use his time at the Meeter Center to write a chapter of his Ph. D. dissertation. The focus of his thesis is on Christ's descent into Hell in Calvin's theology. Fellowship awarded in 2020.

Jeannette Kreijkes, Ph.D. student in theology at the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam, will examine John Chrysostom's influence on John Calvin's work and thought, as part of her work for her dissertation. Fellowship awarded in 2020.

Emo Van Halsema Fellowships:

Dr. Max Rogland, Senior Minister of Rosehill Presbyterian Church, will work on his manuscript for an exegetical commentary on the book of Esther, under contract with Zondervan. He will also be doing research on Reformed understandings of the book of Ecclesiastes. Fellowship awarded in 2021.

Dr. Martin Klauber, Affiliate Professor of Church History at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, will read the unpublished correspondence of Huguenot pastors who served at Charenton. Dr. Klauber began his research at the Meeter Center in 2019, intending to return in 2020 to complete his fellowship. However, due to pandemic restrictions in 2020, he will return this summer instead.

Spring 2021 Online Reformation Series

This spring, the Meeter Center has continued to present a series of live Zoom sessions on Reformation topics. Each session features one or more scholars talking about their recent work.

On February 11th we hosted an online discussion of worship practices in the Reformation era. Meeter Center Director Karin Maag discussed her latest book, *Worshiping with the Reformers* (IVP 2021) with Dr. Graeme Murdock (associate professor in European History at Trinity College Dublin) followed by a moderated Q&A based on audience questions.

On April 12th at 1:00 p.m. EST we will host an event highlighting the work of Dr. Susan Karant-Nunn (emerita, University of Arizona). Dr. Karant-Nunn will speak on the main themes that have shaped Reformation historiography throughout her career. She will be joined by Dr. Beth Plummer (University of Arizona) and Dr. Victoria Christman (Luther College), who will talk about the themes of the volume of essays on the Reformation they edited in Dr. Karant-Nunn's honor.
