## From the Director

The Meeter Center for Calvin Studies has had a very positive academic year. The Newsletter has been redesigned and renamed the Calvin Courier. Our collection of books and articles continues to expand, and our valuable rare book collection has also been enhanced. Furthermore, we have had an excellent group of applicants for our Faculty Research Fellowships, Student Research Fellowships and the Emo F. J. Van Halsema Fellowship.

Arriving from the U.K. in the middle of a western Michigan winter, one of our faculty fellows, Dr. Carl Trueman, will stay through the summer. On the faculty of the University of Nottingham, Trueman will be working on Calvin's influence on John Owen.

In addition to our normal activities, some exciting new projects are being planned or are under way. We announced earlier that we had produced a home page for the World Wide Web (http://www.calvin.edu/~pfields /meeter/html). That home page has been updated, expanded and improved. We are hoping soon to add to the home page the ability to access the Calvin Courier electronically. # Meeter Center Colloquium Series

On February 15, Professor Philip Holtrop of the Religion and Theology Department of Calvin College gave a lecture entitled "Are There Tensions in Calvin's Theology? The Bolsec Controversy As a Case Study." Recounting his personal theological odyssey including contacts with H. Richard Niebuhr at Harvard and G. C. Berkouwer at the Free University of Amsterdam, Holtrop argued that Calvin's doctrine of predestination was hardened by his political ambition and animosity toward Jerome Bolsec.

Increasing scholarly consensus to the contrary notwithstanding, Holtrop contended that scholasticism is not merely a theological method, but in fact imports heteronomous Aristotelian categories into biblical thought. Holtrop maintained, in the tradition of Berkouwer, that rather than teach a determinate doctrine of election, the church should understand election as pertaining to the "depth dimension of our lives."

Holtrop concluded with exhortations—directed particularly to the Christian Reformed Church—to avoid unbiblical presuppositions, to contend against "disputatiousness and polemics" and to give no quarter to intolerance.

# Fellowships Awarded in 1996

Faculty Research Fellowship. Dr. Michael Bihary, professor at John Calvin Theological Academy in Komarno, Czech Republic, will do research on Calvin's ecclesiology this summer. Dr. Carl Trueman, a professor of theology at the University of Nottingham, United Kingdom, is currently studying the background to John Owen's theology in John Calvin.

**Emo F. J. Van Halsema Fellowship.** Rev. Mark Gornik, director of New Song New York City Project, plans to do work on Calvinism and the poor. Ms. Mimako Saito, a vicar in the Presbytery of Tokyo, will study Calvin's sermons on Job.

**Student Research Fellowship.** Taedoo Chung, a student at the University of Texas, plans to research the topics of consistory, church and state.

The Meeter Center fellowship applications for 1997 are now available. Submit completed applications to the Director of the Meeter Center by January 1, 1997.

Non-stipendiary scholars have included Dr. Harold Kallemeyn, professor at Faculté Libre de Théologie Réformée, Aix-en-Provence, France, who did research in the area of Calvin's preaching. Princeton Seminary Ph. D. candidate Bonnie Pattison continues her work on the theological role of poverty in Calvin's doctrine of the church.

# Hugh and Eve Meeter Calvinism Awards for High School Seniors

"John Calvin and Discipline: In Society, Home and Church" proved to be a very challenging topic for high school seniors participating in this year's essay contest. Students from Michigan, Ontario and British Columbia submitted papers. Scott Westhouse from Dorr, Michigan, won first place and received \$2,500. For the first time three students, Amanda Drost, Bronwyn Drost (twins from Sarnia, Ontario) and Stacey Wieland of Grand Rapids, Michigan, won second-place awards—each receiving \$1,250. All four winners plan to attend Calvin College in the fall of 1996.
