

Green Team– Urban Ecological Restoration

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Introduction

Plaster Creek, though its watershed is home to many potential stewards in Grand Rapids, is the most polluted creek in West Michigan. The Green Team, an initiative of Plaster Creek Stewards, is a group of students that work during the summer with a three-part focus: research, education, and restoration projects within the watershed. The team works toward this goal through urban green infrastructure, utilizing native plants to manage stormwater. Two Calvin students, Araceli Eikenberry and Stephanie Praamsma, and eight high school students living in the Plaster Creek watershed were hired by PCS this summer to work and learn together. The group was mentored by Gary Warners, a middle school science teacher. Nearby in Rockford, a similar Green Team for the Rogue River worked to maintain their watershed, and joined the Plaster Creek team occasionally for projects.

Our Work

Alongside the high school students of the Green Team, we worked with our leader Gary Warners on various Plaster Creek Projects. We joined them in restoring our watershed through native landscaping, meeting community leaders, hearing about environmental careers and workplaces, and learning in the classroom about watershed ecology. A key focus of our work was to develop personal relationships with the students, and to be open, relatable sources of knowledge about our journeys through life and college.

During our days together we learned about each other's diverse backgrounds, cultural nuances, passions, preferences, and dreams and plans for the future. To conclude each session, photos and stories articulating the experience and the importance of our work were presented at a finale dinner for the students and their families. Students received awards and plants highlighting and affirming their unique personal characteristics. Through this work we became better at learning through listening and leading by example. We hope the students leave this experience with a better understanding of restoration, a pride in their positive environmental impacts, and a confidence to pursue college and possibly an environmentally conscious career.

Projects

Alger Heights and Oakdale Rain Gardens

We prepared, planted, and performed maintenance on rain gardens to capture, slow, and cool street runoff to Plaster Creek from these two target neighborhoods.

Kreiser Pond

We removed invasive species and sowed native seeds at this restoration site intended to capture, slow, and clean storm water in Silver Creek, a major tributary to Plaster Creek.

Research Shadow Day

For one day each session, students were matched with Calvin researchers to shadow and learn about research and doing research for a college.

CRC Denominational Building

We removed invasive plants and planted native plants at the Christian Reformed Church's world headquarters building, a site of a restored prairie in progress, rain gardens, and a number of native plant berms.

Catalyst Partners

We performed maintenance on a bioswale and native landscaping around Catalyst, an environmental consulting business in downtown Grand Rapids. During our visit, we received a tour of the most highly LEED-certified building from Catalyst Partners president Keith Winn.

Well House

We lent helping hands in planting native plants at a community farm at Well House, a Grand Rapids organization that provides safe, affordable housing to the homeless.

Native Plant Propagation

We collected seeds, sowed seeds in a greenhouse, and transplanted the seedlings of native plants for the use in future plantings.
