Programs for New Faculty

"What do you do for your new faculty?" This is a common question among those who call themselves faculty developers (i.e., people who administrate what typically are called centers for faculty development in teaching and learning). Last year, Calvin's Teaching Fellows frequently asked this question as we researched trends in such programming for new faculty at undergraduate institutions. We explored this sort of programming and resource allocation both at colleges like Calvin (e.g., Albion College) and at larger institutions (e.g., University of Virginia). To complement this external perspective, we gathered internal input from recently hired Calvin faculty and experienced department chairs. The main question we wanted to answer was, "What could we do here at Calvin for new faculty regarding teaching that will support the departmental mentoring already in play?" Out of this research we developed a series of new programs designed specifically to assist new faculty as they explore what it means to teach effectively. This programming is set to launch this academic year.

Two basic programs will soon come into play. The first program is titled "Teaching at Calvin" and encompasses the must-know aspects of teaching here. Topics of study include writing fair exams and assignments, facilitating class discussion, and administering and interpreting student evaluations. This program began at orientation in August and extends through the fall semester. The second program is titled "In-Depth Study of Teaching and Learning" and spans two semesters. In the first semester, faculty study research-based models of how people learn and consider how these models inform teaching decisions. In the second semester, faculty implement a new teaching practice deemed consistent with the models for learning they studied earlier. During this semester, faculty will observe each other's classrooms to offer feedback and support. All of this programming is intended to occur before a faculty member undergoes a major teaching evaluation associated with reappointment or a contract renewal. The Teaching Fellows this year—Crystal Bruxvoort, Jim Jadrich, and Jo-Ann Van Reeuwyk—are delighted to serve new faculty as leaders in this new programming work.
