
Joy in Our Watershed

So often we are reminded of the neglected and damaged state of Plaster Creek, but every once in a while we stumble across hidden areas that haven't experienced this and remain healthy and intact. Moments like these send our hearts over the moon with joy and vision. We want to share them with you: hidden ravines lush with threatened woodland ephemeral flowers, Pawpaw trees laden with blossoms, and a rookery of Blue Herons with 25 nests in a few strong streamside Sycamores.







Spring Event 2021

Each year we host a Fall and Spring Event, when we combine education and restoration around a focus in our watershed. This Spring, our focus was **Trees to Heal the Plaster Creek Watershed.** 90 volunteers from our community came out to plant over 100 native trees at 3 sites in our watershed. The trees will catch, absorb, and help clean polluted runoff that was otherwise destined for Plaster Creek.

Education on Cedar

To highlight and explain the importance of the tree plantings, we partnered with Next Step of West Michigan to create and install permanent cedar signs. We're grateful and excited for these engraved cedar works of art in our community!

These projects are funded in part by a Great Lakes Restoration Initiative grant through the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This institution, EPA, and the Forest Service are equal opportunity providers.
